The prevalence results represent estimated values that are very close to the actual values for adults (ages18+) living below 200% of poverty in California who experienced food insecurity (with and without hunger) in California in 2001and 2003. Because the estimated value is based on a sample of this population, it has a degree of uncertainty, and the confidence interval (C.I.) shows the range where the actual value would lie. Hence, for 95% C.I., you can assume with 95% confidence that the actual value lies between the lower and upper C.I. range.
