in the 65+ population as the "boomers" turn 65. While many older adults are living longer and healthier lives, the prevalence of chronic disease in the older population remains high. For those of limited economic means, the challenges associated with accessing care and managing complex health conditions are heightened. In California, the elderly population will double to nearly 8 million by 2026. Currently, 1.1 million Californians are "dual-eligible" – those who qualify for both Medicaid and Medicare and are typically the most medically and financially vulnerable. This panel examines how the physical, psychological and social care needs of vulnerable California seniors are being assessed and addressed.
